
The month got off to a great start—after all, it was my birthday month, and I turned 19!





Speaking to the Heart

Hi, Friends!

My name is Tafara Chogugudza, and I'm 22 years old. This year, I embarked on the Abundant Life (ABL) program, and with each passing month, I see more clearly why God placed me here—not just to be blessed, but to be a blessing to others. It's now been about four months, and I'm beginning to find my footing and enjoy the experience more deeply.

Our Process

A New Chapter: Team Leadership

This year, we've had the special privilege of being the first ABL team in about five years to have elected leaders—a President, Deputy, and Spiritual Leader. After three rounds of voting, a two-hour committee meeting, and one very intense interview for each of us, it was decided that I should serve as team President for 2025.

When I heard the news, my heart dropped. The weight of such a great responsibility hit me-but I believe, by God's grace, that this will be an amazing year.

Afrikaans Camp Meeting Preparations

Amper sê ek, "ons is geskep om vry te wees," because all I could think about were my lines for the Afrikaans play! This was my first time attending an Afrikaans camp meeting, and I was curious to see what it would be like. Unlike Mission Convention, we didn't have a long list of responsibilities—but we did have a major one: performing a full play in Afrikaans.

Fast forward to just a few days before camp, and somehow, I was speaking Afrikaans like I'd been doing it for years. I could understand my lines and deliver them with expression and meaning through tone and body language. It was truly incredible. Being asked to do the appeal at the end of the play was also a special privilege. It allowed me to put into practice some of the principles I learned in my Speech and Homiletics classes at Purelight Missions.

The Camp Meeting Experience

When we arrived, we realised we'd forgotten the rubber mallet—probably because we were so focused on the play! So, our tent didn't meet the usual ABL standard... and we ended up breaking it down and pitching it again the next day.

Practicing the play in the actual hall helped us get comfortable with the space. As each day passed, the anxiety grew-even though I knew my lines, I still feared that something might go wrong. But God came through. I was able to share the powerful message of the Baggage Play in a foreign language, and so clearly that people were surprised-even my pronunciation was on point!

That experience reminded me how powerful it is to speak someone's language. It breaks barriers and creates connection.

In the words of Nelson Mandela:
"If you talk to a man in a language he understands, that
goes to his head. If you talk to him in his language, that goes
to his heart."

That's exactly what we need to do with the Gospel-we must speak in a way that reaches people's hearts. A theoretical understanding alone won't save us.

Looking Ahead




