After the 2 weeks of touring, we went back to the bush to refresh and refocus on God and our mission for this year. We spent the few days as a team praying and studying the Bible together. It was an amazing time. What stood out to me was the 24h worship we had from Friday evening to Saturday evening, we each got our spot in the field to stay for the 24 hours, just ourself, God and nature.

Over the course of our mission, we reached out to over 6,000 children, sharing love, hope, and the powerful message of God's grace.
